


Figure 1: Population Growth in the United States and Massachusetts 2000 - 2010 and 2010 - 2020


Figure 3: Latino Share of Employment in the United States 2000 - 2020



Figure 4: Latino Share of Industry Workers Where Shares Exceed Share of Latino Workers Overall 2020






Figure 6: Non-Healthcare Essential Workers and Health Insurance: Share Without Insurance by Race and Ethnicity in New England

Figure 7: New England Service Workers Prior to the Pandemic



January 2000 - September 2021



September 2020 - September 2021



Figure 11: College-Educated Population Share Spreads in the United States: White Share Minus Latino Share


1986 - 2020
