Early College

Increased funding was a major win for the newly established Massachusetts Alliance for Early College which includes the Roundtable, State Street, and UMass Boston among several supporting organizations. APPROVED



Talent Agenda to Drive Competitiveness

During the legislative session, the Roundtable released two reports on the Future of Work, representing member feedback from surveys conducted in the spring of 2021 and 2022. While 80% of surveyed members plan to maintain or expand its presence in Massachusetts and cited "access to world-class, diverse talent" as a driver, Massachusetts' competitive calling card—talent—may be threatened as employers and talent become increasingly mobile. Recognizing this potential



threat, the Roundtable developed: "A Talent Agenda to Drive Massachusetts' Competitiveness," released in the fall of 2021 and outlining strategies to attract and retain talent, develop talent, and diversify talent. This Agenda served as a framework for advocacy during the legislative session including advocacy for APRA funding plus funding for workforce development, child care, and other Roundtable policy priorities.

GOOD FOR BUSINESS

Expanding Mental Health & Wellness

The mental health and wellness of employees consistently ranks among key employee benefits—part of a new wave of benefits since the start of the pandemic. In May 2022, the Roundtable's Future of Work & Massachusetts Competitiveness Survey found 89% of responding members reported that offering mental health and wellness programs were among the most helpful benefits to attract and retain talent.

During the 2021-22 Legislative Session, the Roundtable understood the value of this employee benefit and incorporated mental health reforms as part of its advocacy at the State House. Following advocacy to both the Senate and House, the Roundtable's testimony to the Mental Health Conference Committee urged inclusion to require coverage of annual mental health exams, increase capacity for providers in the mental health system, and continue to focus on children, provisions which were incorporated into the final legislation passed and signed by Governor Baker.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

The Roundtable advocated for additional priorities that are still pending in omnibus economic development legislation.

Housing

"Among the biggest concerns for workers weighing whether to stay in Massachusetts—or relocate here—is the high cost of housing... As you consider allocation of ARPA and surplus dollars, we respectfully urge you to consider housing that focuses on increasing supply to make workforce housing more affordable, addressing burdensome regulations, and providing access to home ownership, particularly in communities of color."

Tax Relief
